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WHEN I LOOK BACK ON 2019/2020 IT WAS A YEAR OF 2 DISTINCT AND CONTRASTING PERIODS BUT THE UNDERLYING FOUNDATION IN BOTH WAS OUR PASSION FOR MOUNTAIN BIKING WHICH I TRULY BELIEVE GOT A LOT OF PEOPLE AND COMMUNITIES THROUGH THE TOUGH TIMES OF THE GLOBAL PANDEMIC OF COVID-19.

Earlier in the year we continued to welcome new recreation and race members as well as coaches and officials to MTBA, voted to join forces with BMX and Road and Track clubs to form AusCycling, and were inspired by incredible performances by athletes competing in local, national and international races. Early indications were promising for another great year and then in March 2020 during the very successful Nationals in Bright, Victoria the worldwide pandemic began unfolding in Australia. State and international borders were closed, events and mass gatherings were cancelled, and households were locked down to minimise transmission of the highly infectious disease. The focus of the board and

management team changed overnight to the safety of our members, staff and athletes during this challenging and uncertain time. And I can proudly say as we start to come out of the other end of this unprecedented event, how well the staff, clubs and members coped with the changes, uncertainties and pressures. The pace of the change was surprising and differed in each State and region, but the staff stepped up to the challenge extremely well, and within days were working from home, new memberships products were offered, support and advice provided to clubs and virtual races were scheduled to connect our members to others where ever they were located in Australia to enable them to compete despite not being able to travel to the trails. This would not have been possible without good financial planning by previous boards who wisely retained sufficient working capital to keep the organisation going through short periods of tough times, incredible leadership by Shane Coppin and Denise Cox to maintain a calm and caring culture, dedication and loyalty by the members and clubs who stuck with MTBA during the tough times, as well support from the government in the form of Jobkeeper payments and cashflow stimulus.

While continuing to support members and clubs during the second half of the year, a number of staff and board members focused on the large amount of work required to transition MTBA into AusCycling; a single organisation representing all cyclists in Australia and the largest governance reform project undertaken in Australian Sports. Perhaps it is in the DNA of mountain bikers to take on big challenges but again everyone rose to the occasion and on 1 November 2020, 16 entities responsible for cycling in Australia will become one with the formation of AusCycling. What started as a vision 3years ago will soon become a reality. As a leader of one of the three NSO's during this significant transformation project it has been a very busy year with an equal proportion of robust and rewarding conversations. A big shout out to the leaders of BMXA and Cycling Australia who have been on the journey with us, as well as dedicated staff from Sports Australia and a number of consultants and individuals who provided advice, support and assistance.

The move to AusCycling definitely comes with mixed emotions for me as the Chair. MTBA has an awesome culture, and great staff and members who love to ride their bikes off road, but we also recognise the future of cycling in Australia will be better off if we Ride Together rather than compete against one another. I am sad to see MTBA wind up as an organisation while at the same time immensely proud of everything the team has achieved and will take with them into AusCycling. I will continue to be involved and represent the mountain biking community and members as a Director of AusCycling for a finite period of time. As members you should be reassured to know the familiar faces of MTBA staff will continue to support the mountain biking community, members, officials, coaches and volunteers while also sharing their unique sense of adventure and passion for biking with colleagues from BMXA and Cycling Australia.

The staff have continued to plan ahead during the tough times in preparation for restrictions being lifted across the country and we are all looking forward to seeing community engagement events, education courses, races and other initiatives that will continue to promote and expand the benefits of mountain biking to riders and communities across Australia.

A massive thanks to our CEO Shane Coppin for the truly amazing job he did in an extremely challenging year. His talented, dedicated, passionate and high performing team continued to support him and deliver results for the organisation which is a true testament to his great leadership and character. He should be proud of the organisation he built and led for 7 years and AusCycling should be inspired by the greatness that can be built when you focus on people who are the heart of a member based sporting organisation.

Congratulations to the elite mountain biking athletes who have consistently stood on international podiums throughout the 2019/20 season. Thanks very much for inspiring thousands of fans, children and riders at home. A huge thanks to all our clubs, volunteers, coaches, administrators, parents and families who provide their time, passion and support to enable 18,000 members to 'Live their Life Off Road' on trails we all love.

Congratulations to all the award winners at this year's MTBA Awards ceremony held in March at the Nationals, the inaugural Hall of Fame recipients: Caroline Buchanan, Chris Kovarik, Dan McConnell, Donna Dall, Janine Jungfels, Jason English, Mick Hannah, Nathan Rennie, Bec McConnell, Sam Hill, Sharon Heap, Tracey Hannah, Troy Brosnan and the MTBA Legend: Sam Hill. These awards acknowledge their great achievements and contributions of members to our sport.

And finally, thanks to my fellow board members who volunteer their time and expertise to govern MTBA and a sport they are truly passionate about: Lachlan Murray, Wayne Shearer, Lisa Morisset, Robyn Walker, Peter McKendry, Alison Blyth and Tony Scott. We have all had a lot to deal with in our own personal and professional lives this year, but I always knew there were others I could count on to help.

IN THE HISTORY OF MTBA, THE PAST YEAR HAS BEEN ONE OF THE MOST CHALLENGING AND MOST SUCCESSFUL.

The organisation has experienced continued growth, a historic vote to join AusCycling and to end MTBA as it exists today, witnessed some sensational international and domestic performances, an increase in the number of members, coaches and officials, seen significant public attention on the value of mountain biking as an economic stimulus and tourism product. and has spent the last four months of the financial year trying to navigate our way through the severe challenges of a worldwide pandemic.

MTBA gained State Sporting Sporting (SSO) recognition in the Northern Territory in June 2019 and for the first time received funding from the NT Government. With this funding MTBA was able to employ two new staff on a part-time basis to support, develop and grow opportunities for mountain biking in the NT. MTBA are currently the recognised SSO in three other States (Queensland, Tasmania and Victoria) and receives relevant funding and support.

International performances for Australian riders were again a feature of our year with great results at World Cups, the World Championships and EWS events. Congratulations to Rebecca McConnell (3rd Elite Women) and Troy Brosnan

(2nd Elite DH) at the UCI World Championships along with Troy's 3rd Overall Elite Men's World Cup result and also to Fenella Harris on 3rd place overall in the Junior EWS category. With a special mention and congratulations to Kye Ahern (UCI DH Junior World Champion), Sam Hill (EWS Elite Men's Champion) and Tracey Hannah (1st Overall Elite Women's World Cup) results. Another great year for Australian riders overseas.

At the November AGM, MTBA members voted on the future of the organisation with a YES vote to join the new proposed organisation AusCycling – a proposal to unify and amalgamate nineteen cycling organisations in Australia across all disciplines. The vote to join was an overwhelming 89% in support. This decision will see MTBA transition itself into the new entity within the next twelve months, and then apply for cancellation of MTBA's registration. This is an enormous step in the future of our sport and organisation. The decision is expected to position the future of mountain biking with considerably more influence, representation and opportunities to benefit members and clubs through the consolidation of the sport into a larger all discipline organisation.

It is also a time to reflect, as this will be the last year of MTBA as an ongoing entity. MTBA has had a short life, but it is an organisation that has achieved an incredible amount given it has had to work and support its growth, members, and development from within and with limited government support. MTBA and those that make up the organisation pride itself on its relationship with members, clubs and all within the mountain bike community. Thank-you to all who have contributed to the organisation throughout its history. From the initial founders, through to the board directors (of both MTBA Incorporated and MTBA Limited), all the staff who have worked with the business over the years, but most importantly to all the members and clubs (past and present), who are MTBA.

At the annual MTBA Awards, held in March, the inaugural Hall of Fame members were announced as part of the annual ceremony held to acknowledge the great achievements and contributions of members to our sport. Congratulations to all award winners.

This year saw our last National Championships to be held in Bright, Victoria and it was a tremendous success. The event attracted the highest number of individual entries for a National Championship over the past few years. Congratulations to all involved and thank-you to the Victorian Government, Alpine Shire Council and Alpine Cycling Club for your continued support.

Late in 2019 MTBA conducted a range of successful separate National Championships in conjunction with partners and event hosts for CX, XCM, Fat Tyre, Gravity Enduro and Schools.

Unfortunately, as a result of COVID restrictions, we were forced to delay a number of National events, including National Championships scheduled in the early half of 2020 to later in the year.

The new National Cup competition finished its first full year in December. In its first year the new competition format was a success and shows tremendous opportunity for growth and potential in the future. Unfortunately, the 2020 National Cup was significantly impacted by COVID and we needed to postpone and eventually cancel the competition for the 2020 year and focus attention towards 2021.

In March, as State Governments starting imposing restrictions and lockdowns to combat the COVID pandemic, the impact to MTBA was felt immediately. Events, races and activities stopped, member numbers declined and revenue from events and memberships were negatively affected. The organisation was placed in a high state of hibernation, staff continued to work from home (some hours were reduced) and we shifted focus to survival, supporting our clubs and members as best we could, planning for a future recovery and working through enormous workload required for the transition into AusCycling. MTBA were very fortunate and thankful to the Australian Government for their support during the crisis via JobKeeper and the Cashflow Stimulus initiatives. This support allowed us to maintain our workforce over the past months.

Early into the crisis, MTBA realigned its attention to promoting mountain biking as a significant health and wellbeing activity and focused our membership towards the lifestyle pursuits and health outcomes mountain biking can offer. MTBA established a COVID Sub Committee that

has met every week since April to continue to monitor the pandemic and the impact. During this period a considerable amount of work has been required to stay up to date and inform clubs and members of the continually changing restrictions as a result of COVID. My thanks and acknowledgment to Denise Cox for her work on this during this period. MTBA received two small State Government grants during the period, but other than JobKeeper and the Cashflow Stimulus has managed its cashflow and operations through minimal revenue levels and cash reserves.

The transition into AusCycling is a significant project and many of MTBA's staff have been involved since March in working through the development of new projects and systems as we bring together multiple entities and disciplines as one new organisation. Our thanks and acknowledgment to our colleagues at BMXA, Cycling Australia and all across the SSO's networks who have supported and contributed to this project. A special thank-you to SportAus for its continued support as we have worked through the project and to the various consultants and individuals who have provided advice, support and assistance.

Our membership numbers were continuing to grow across all categories and just prior to the COVID pandemic, our financial membership base broke 18,000 individual members for the first time in MTBA's history. This is a great reflection on the value and work provided by the team of high-quality staff that MTBA is very fortunate to have working for the organisation, delivering services and benefits to members and clubs. MTBA continues to expand its reach and value into the broader mountain bike community primarily through involvement in the promotion of mountain biking, guidance and support of mountain bike strategies and engaging new participants through initiatives such as MTB-101 and Come'n'Try Days.

In July MTBA were successful in securing funding through the Federal Governments Building Better Regions Fund to deliver a series of mountain bike workshops in regional communities and undertake an economic and participation analysis of mountain biking in Australia. Firstly the bushfires and secondly the COVID pandemic impacted the delivery of these two projects which are now expected to be completed in FY21.

The financial result for the year was a deficit of \$181,955 as a result of the COVID crisis. Prior to COVID the organisation, was forecasting a small surplus, but with the significant loss to membership revenues and some smaller revenue streams (well in-excess to the offset provided by the Jobkeeper support received), the company was unable to avoid reporting a loss for the year. Early predictions in April, were significantly worse than the actual year-end deficit, so whilst a loss overall is disappointing, it is a much better outcome than we first predicted.

There have been many other activities, programs and initiatives throughout the year, across education, promotion, resource development, engagement and value-adding to the sport. Whilst much of this became disrupted late in the year, the organisation is certainly looking to restart these activities as soon as possible and continue the work and development across these areas.

There are so many people to thank every year, mountain biking has a nation-wide community and it just keeps growing. Firstly, I wish to thank and acknowledge the team and staff at MTBA. You always make me proud and you have shaped, contributed and helped make MTBA what is today – a very proud, capable and professional member-based organisation. To the numerous clubs, volunteers and supporters, you never cease to amaze and your commitment to the sport is paramount to its success. To the MTBA Board and members of our Audit Risk and Remuneration Committee, thank-you for your continued support and trust in the team, your counsel and advice when needed. It's been a pleasure to work with you over the past twelve months. A very special acknowledgment to Chair of MTBA, Lee Brentzell. You have truly led this organisation

through extremely challenging times and into the transition to AusCycling. The workload and demands placed on you as a volunteer have been considerable in the past 12 months, but you have always found the time and our sport is only better for your efforts, passion and commitment.

MTBA is very fortunate to have a tremendous team, from our Board, to our staff, our advisory committees, our coaches, our commissaires and officials, our volunteers, our partners (both Government and commercial), our clubs, but most importantly our members. MTBA has always sought to ensure we remain and are continually focused on the delivery of services and benefits along with facilitating opportunities for our members. We constantly challenge ourselves and seek feedback to continually improve in this area and hope that our service to you as members during the past year has been of the highest standard.

This will be my last report as CEO of MTBA. Thank you firstly for the opportunity to become involved with this sport nearly seven years ago. I am very humbled and appreciative of the chance I was given to be CEO of such a dynamic, progressive and exciting sport and outdoor recreation activity. Thanks to all who have advised, assisted, supported and worked with me over the years. I have had a great time, learned a lot, met so many wonderful people and am proud to have been involved with such a tremendous sport and organisation.

ADDENDUM TO THE REPORT – JULY 2020 TO SEPTEMBER 2020

In the period July to October, MTBA member numbers have rebounded to the levels they were at the start of COVID. However race membership levels remain lower, whilst recreational member numbers have increased considerably.

Some levels of racing throughout the country have returned and whilst some areas remain restricted, club racing generally has returned to a reasonable level of competition. Unfortunately, Victoria's recovery remains very slow. Cross border racing is still extremely limited and MTBA are continuing not to conduct any National competitions for the remainder of 2020.

The UCI will conduct the 2020 MTB World Championships during October and whilst MTBA selected a team based on merit to attend, we were forced due to the continuing pandemic throughout the World to significantly restrict riders who could attend to only those professional riders who would be supported by their professional trade team at the event. MTBA did not send any staff to the World Championships due to restrictions and risk assessments. A number of athletes in addition also chose not to attend. Congratulations to Rebecca McConnell on placing 3rd in Elite Women (XCO) following on from her great result twelve months earlier.

MTBA has commenced conduct of some education and engagement programs in certain areas of the country. There are 40 coaching courses planned between September and the end of December.

Financially, the organisation has been able to trade profitably throughout the last four months since June 2020 and has recovered and rebuilt its cash reserves and equity to the same level or better for the same period twelve months ago. MTBA is currently in a very strong and sustainable position, given the FY20 year-end result.

Progress on the transition to AusCycling continues and the new organisation will commence operations from 1 November 2020. AusCycling will now commence with 16 organisations joining on Day 1, including all three NSOs (BMXA, CA and MTBA). MTBA will transition the business across to AusCycling at the end of October, and then commence the process to cancel its registration.

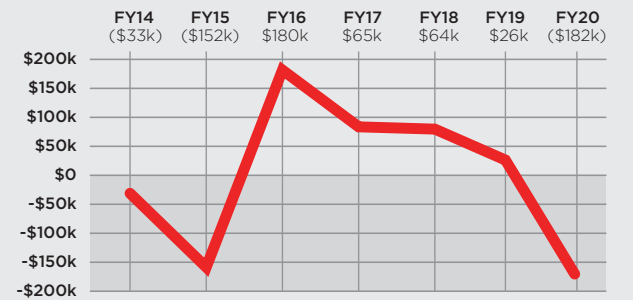

MEMBERSHIP

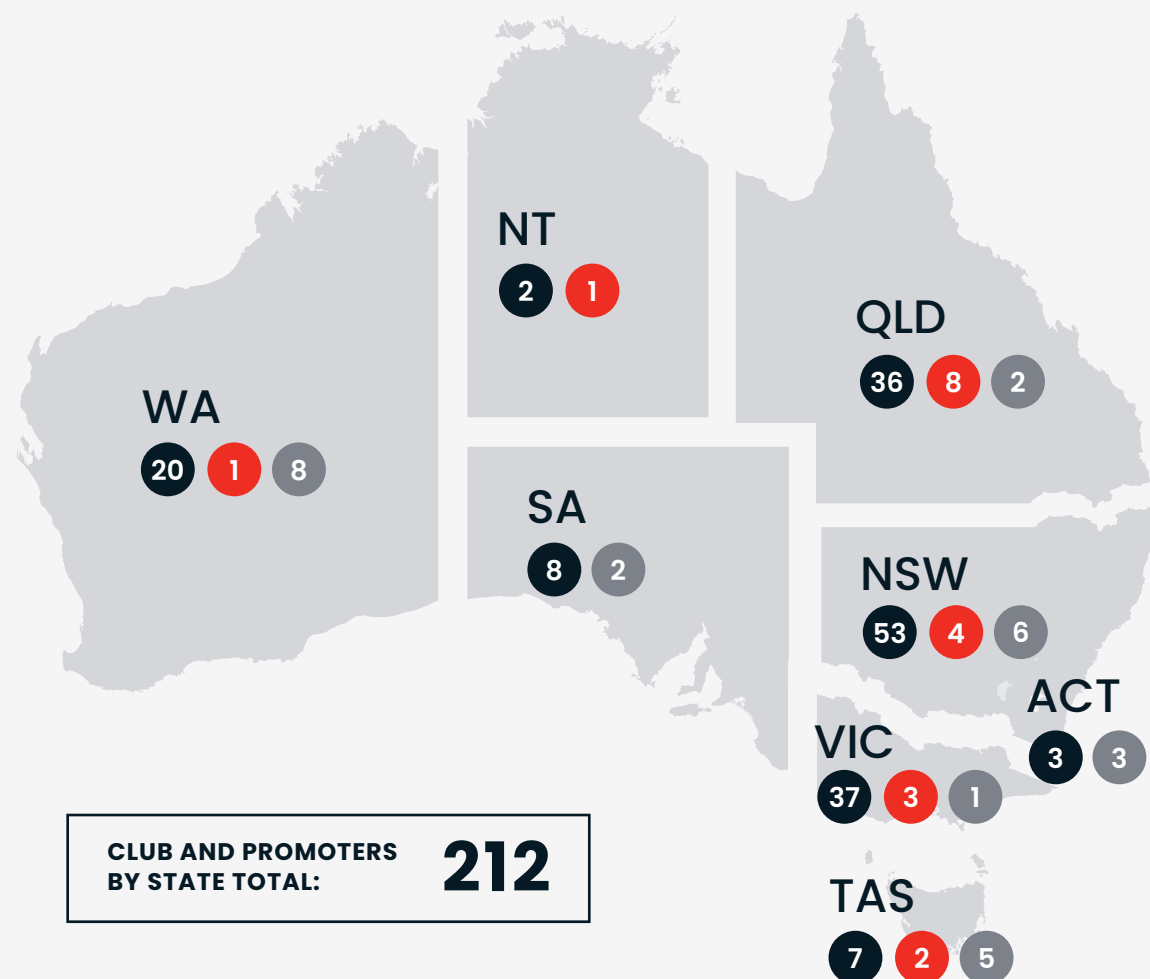

RIDDLED WITH THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, THE 2019/20 FINANCIAL YEAR WILL GO DOWN IN HISTORY AS ONE OF SIGNIFICANT DIFFICULTIES, CHALLENGES AND HARDSHIP, THE MAGNITUDE NOT SEEN IN THE LAST 100 YEARS.

The full extent is unlikely to be known for many years as the global economy continues to bear the brunt of the pandemic and aftermaths. Mountain Bike Australia was not immune to the pandemic, with its own financial concerns, however what was seen as a terribly dark time for all businesses in Australia, has come some genuine positivity for the mountain biking.

The MTBA membership program works slightly differently to other sporting codes. Rather than all members having a set anniversary like Cycling Australia (31st December) or AFL Clubs (31st October), MTBA has rolling anniversaries, meaning the date you started your membership is the date of your anniversary. From an annual perspective, the differences in models is largely irrelevant, however when a pandemic hits in Q1, the cumulative impact on revenues

increased week on week as the country's lockdown measures became tighter and all racing was either cancelled or postponed. MTBA was quick to pivot, offering various forms of membership during those lock-down months, including shorter duration (eg 3 and 6 month recreational memberships – a cheaper option which still provides members with insurance, without racing.). The MTBA management team was also quick to put in place strict spend protocols to help mitigate the revenue shortfalls.

As lockdown rules changed, and outside exercise was allowed, Australians turned to their local bike shops, emptying their shelves with manufacturers not being able to keep up with demand. Local MTB parks were flooded with new (and reborn) mountain bikers and consequently, MTBA saw a huge spike in recreational memberships in some states. Whilst many of the recreational memberships sold were downgrades from existing Race memberships during the period, it was terrific to see new cohorts of mountainbikers hitting the bush, and at my local trails in Brisbane, kids, teenagers and adults alike finding the benefits of Living Your Life Off-road!

Thrown into chaotic year of 2019/20, your MTBA board and management team pushed on with the transition to AusCycling as voted by MTBA members at the last AGM. In the 11 months since the AGM (30 November 2019), as well as having to navigate COVID-19 lockdown

stresses and financial s difficulties, the MTBA staff, management team and board have successfully transitioned the company to AusCycling, effective 31 October 2020. This is a tremendous feat and I can assure all MTBA members that whilst the transition to AusCycling has appeared seamless, this is purely down to the dedication and determination of those behind the scenes putting the building blocks in place for an AusCycling success. Any words given to praise to the team for their efforts wouldn't do them justice and while the collective effort of the MTBA board, management team and the staff group has created something not seen in Australian sport before, I would like to single out Lee Brentzell (MTBA Chair) and Shane Coppin (MTBA CEO) who have worked tirelessly and selflessly to see that the AusCycling project was a success (even in a COVID-19 year)

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The financial report shows an 8% decline year on year for 2020 membership and considering membership fees represent over 70% of total revenues, this shortfall was a challenge for the MTBA management team to mitigate. Other revenue lines (entry fees, courses and programs) were also down compared to 2019, however offsetting the shortfalls was the ATO Job Keeper program.

Whilst MTBA ended the 2019/20 year with a deficit of \$182k, pleasingly the July-October months of MTBA (before AusCycling transition)

saw strong financial performances, with \$119k (\$404k normalised after AusCycling transition expenses) in accumulated profits for the period, taking the cumulative profits for the 16 month period (July 2019 – October 2020) to a deficit of \$63k (and a normalised result after AusCycling transition expenses of a \$222k surplus). I consider this to be phenomenal achievement given what has transpired through the year. Equally, it's terrific to know that MTBA has been handed over to AusCycling with a massive wave of momentum behind it so we as members can benefit in the years to come from increased advocacy, pathways, development and support.

Its been an absolutely pleasure working alongside the rest of the MTBA board, management team and staff group and I look forward to seeing what can be achieved under the AusCycling badge going forward,



Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30 June 2020

The financial statements cover Mountain Bike Australia Limited as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Mountain Bike Australia Limited is a company limited by guarantee.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on the date of signing the Directors report.

1 Basis of Preparation

The directors have prepared the financial statements on the basis that the company is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corporations Act 2001 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the Company's ability to realise its assets and settle its liabilities in the normal course of business.

On the 30 November 2019, the members of MTBA voted in support of joining AusCycling Limited (AusCycling) and cancelling the company's registration prior to the next Annual General Meeting in 2020. AusCycling will be the entity which includes the collective merged businesses of MTBA, Cycling Australia (CA), BMX Australia (BMXA) and 13 state organisations, creating better growth potential for the sport through expanded services and infrastructure for members, stronger voice for advocacy and lobbying and increased commercial opportunities.

Under the Implementation Agreement between MTBA and AusCycling (executed 9 October 2020), MTBA will transfer all assets, liabilities, staff and undertakings to the new Company on or before 31 October 2020 and then commence proceedings to cancel MTBA's registration with an anticipated 3-4 month period for completion by the end of February 2021. AusCycling will commence operations from 1 November 2020.

The Directors are confident that the company has sufficient funds through the on-going operating activities of the company with sufficient cash reserves to settle its liabilities in the normal course of business.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised, as the association is exempt from income tax under sport entity exemption.

(b) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) that are transferred to entities in the economic entity, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

(b) Leases (Continued)

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

The office rental has been treated as a short term operating lease is due to expire in less than 12 months.

(c) Revenue and other income

Grant revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the Company obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

When grant revenue is received whereby the Company incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

Subscriptions

Revenue from the provision of membership subscriptions is recorded on a cash basis.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Company is entitled to it.

Job keeper income and cash flow boost are recorded as ATO Subsidies on an accruals basis.

(d) Accounts receivable and other debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from donors and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(e) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(f) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost.

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

(h) Financial Assets

Financial assets are term deposits with an initial maturity of longer than three months held for the purpose of investment rather than held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments.

(i) Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair amount less costs of disposal and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is determined as the depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Where an impairment loss on a revalued asset is identified, this is debited against the revaluation surplus in respect of the same class of asset to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the amount in the revaluation surplus for that same class of asset.

(j) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(k) Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the company's obligation for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages and salaries. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The company's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages and salaries are recognised as part of accounts payable and other payables in the statement of financial position.

Contributions are made by the company to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred

(l) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(m) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(n) Economic dependence

Mountain Bike Australia Limited is dependent on membership fees for the majority of its revenue used to operate the business. At the date of this report the Board of Directors has no reason to believe the membership base of the company will diminish to provide going concern issues for the company. Refer to Note 17 for further disclosure on events after the end of the reporting period on the merger with BMX Australia and Cycling Australia to create AusCycling Ltd. Current memberships will transfer across to the new entity

3 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Impairment

The management and those charged with governance assess impairment of plant and equipment and intangibles at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions and events specific to the company that may be indicative of impairment triggers.

Inventory

The Company reviews its estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date.

Receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

17 Events after the end of the Reporting Period

The financial report was authorised for issue on the date of signing of the Director's Report.

On the 30 November 2019, the members of MTBA voted in support of joining AusCycling Limited and cancelling the company's registration prior to the next Annual General Meeting in 2020. 

The impact of bushfires and the COVID-19 pandemic have been confronting for communities, where we all know sport plays such an important role.

At the Australian Sports Commission (ASC), comprising Sport Australia and the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS), our energy is focused on supporting our partners through these times as we continue to advocate the importance of sport to our economy, productivity, health, wellbeing and culture.

We believe whole-heartedly that when we get through this challenging period, sport will play a prominent role in lifting the nation's energy and spirits again.

These results are a testament to the tenacity and passion of athletes, coaches, sports staff and sporting organisations, which know we have all the skills and abilities to achieve success.

I am proud too of the service our organisation provides to Australian sport each year, on behalf of the Australian Government.

The ASC, through Sport Australia and the AIS, delivers 25,000 grants a year.

The AIS, funds and prepares our Olympic, Paralympic and Commonwealth Games to represent us at the highest level in international competition.

In the past few years, we have enhanced our support to athlete wellbeing and engagement, a move that is essential, especially in the current environment.

Sport Australia invests in sports participation programs, from our national Sporting Schools program for younger children through to the Better Ageing program aimed at Australians aged 65 and over.

So many of these grants fuel aspirations. Our Local Sporting Champions program supports 9,000 children a year to reach for their sporting dreams.

Our Women Leaders in Sport program and the AIS Talent program provide opportunities for women to progress their professional development in all roles across sport.

We continue to work with sports to modernise traditional governance structures in Australian sporting organisations and we continue to encourage environments that are inclusive, diverse, safe and welcoming, making sport the benchmark for a more equitable society.

This was to be the year of the 2020 Olympics and Paralympics in Tokyo. Instead, it has been postponed to 2021, with the Olympic Games to be held from 23 July to 8 August 2021 and the Paralympics from 24 August to 5 September 2021.

We have already witnessed a great deal of positivity from athletes who now need to re-set. I'm confident, as a united sport system, we will do the same.
